

# From the Vicar...

### A year I will never forget

I've lived most of my life as a student. I didn't take a gap year in-between high school and college, and I quickly enrolled into Seminary before my college graduation. I've held many part time jobs, but most of my life has been dictated by a variety of due dates with regards to papers, projects, readings, and tests. With nearly six additional years of school experience under my belt, I was ready for a change of pace. In fact, I needed a change of pace. This vicarage not only provided that change of pace but provided an opportunity of deep growth and learning. I want to share a few things I learned while serving Immanuel this past year.

### There is no "I" in team

I grew up playing soccer as my main sport. This being a team sport, I quickly learned the benefits of working with other people. I didn't have to be the best player on the field, being skilled in all positions on the field. But I relied on my team to compensate for my weaknesses. If I played left wing, I relied on the center. If I played striker, I relied on the defense to protect the keeper and regain control of the ball. I didn't have to do everything on my own.

When I heard that Immanuel Lutheran Church was a team ministry, I was excited to learn and experience what that meant in a ministry context. The biggest impact I experienced was during the Thanksgiving Dinner Basket Outreach. Due to my limited timeframe, I was overwhelmed by the amount of planning and outsourcing of turkeys I needed to do. But the team around me quickly came to aid in my endeavor. I didn't have to do all the planning and organizing on my own. Not only did the team come to help, but the congregation around me asked how they could help.

Ecclesiastes 4:9-10 writes, "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up. But pity anyone who falls and has no one to help them up." No soccer player really scores a goal on their own, but it is through passing the ball that they are able to score together. No person can really do ministry on their own, but it is through a faithful team, a faithful congregation, and the Holy Spirit that we can boldly share the Gospel.

### I need Jesus every second of the day

This pandemic has challenged me in ways I could not have imagined. I couldn't have predicted a vicarage full of masks and social distancing. I came into vicarage strong and well energized, but with holidays, pandemic events, and filling in for absent staff, I realized I could not do this on my own strength. There were several days where I didn't want to get out of bed and face the unknown challenges that awaited me. But in those moments I realized my true need for God for everything I do. God would fill me with His peace. He would calm my heart of fear and doubt and give me strength to get up each day.

Psalm 37:7 writes, "Be still, and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth!" What I have learned this year is that God will be exalted among the nations and across the earth no matter the situation. No power or pandemic will thwart His glory that He bestows upon His creation. No matter where I go or what church I lead, my constant need of Jesus will always be in the center of my life. He is my source of life and strength that will strengthen and preserve me through any trial or tribulation.

### **Thankfulness**

I am sad that my days at Immanuel are numbered. I am sad that my vicarage must come to an end. But the relationships I have made here will never end. The lessons I have learned here will never go to waste, but will be with me for the rest of my life. Even in the midst of a pandemic, God has used my environment, the church, Pastor Karg, and many people to help me hold fast to His Word, to call upon Him in prayer and praise daily, and to boldly proclaim His Grace and His Mercy. May God bless you as you continue to connect people to the Word of God and His message of salvation. You will always be in my prayers.

\*Use granola chunks, chocolate chips, peanut butter chips, chopped peanuts, or a combination.

Pour milk into medium bowl. Add pudding mix. Beat with

wire whisk until well blended, 1-2 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes. Fold in whipped topping. Stir 1 cup of the cookies and all the "rocks" into pudding mixture. Spoon into pie crust. Sprinkle remaining cookies. Freeze until firm, about 4 hours. What child wouldn't enjoy eating Dirt Pie?!

# Food Pantry



Green! The very color radiates life. It didn't take long for the drabness of late fall and winter here in St. Louis to give way to the vibrancy of trees and plants filled with the greenness of life. When it comes to plants, green is a good thing. Life is present! In our gardens the absence of green is an indicator that things might not be going so well.

The Church has come again to what is sometimes called the "Long Green Season" or the season after Pentecost, meaning that the color of the paraments and vestments are green and will be so for most Sundays until the Last Sunday of the Church Year. The liturgical colors serve as both a teaching device and a way of marking days and seasons. Green is the color of growth, leaves, foliage, fruit and life, suggesting a time of spiritual growth within the church. The Sundays after Pentecost bring the Church to a focus on the teaching of the Lord and its application to the lives of Christians.

The very first psalm appropriately makes the correlation of growth and life, for when a man is connected to the Lord through His word, "He is like a tree planted by streams of water that yields its fruit in its season, and its leaf does not wither." There are certain things necessary for a plant to remain vibrant, healthy and green. Certainly in the heat of summer one of the most important is water. My next door neighbor knows this, which is why every morning as I greet him he is watering the plants in his garden. Without water, there wouldn't be much of a garden. Without water, there would not be a green garden full of life, but rather dirt filled boxes with wilted and dying plants.

The Christian life is no different. The green of the season after Pentecost reminds us that the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives is to be one of growing in the faith; a faith life that brings forth the fruits of a life lived in the Spirit. However, just as the summer heat can take its toll on plants and leave them lifeless and wilting if they are not watered, in the same way, life can leave us sapped, wilted and lifeless if we do not have regular watering with the Water of Life—God's Word made flesh, Jesus Christ. And while in summer we step up the watering to keep our plants healthy, summer is also the time when many of us feel compelled to take a break or vacation from the regularity of God's Word. Unfortunately, COVID has had that same effect on many lives; lives devoid of God's Word are left dry and in need of spiritual nourishment.

The color is green—inside and out. This summer, I pray that everywhere you look you will see green and be reminded not only of the blessing of our Creator in creation but of the blessing of faith granted in baptism and the life you have been granted in the Holy Spirit. Wilted plants cry out to us that every living thing needs water. We know this to be true! Most of us would never deny our physical thirst, but too often it is easy to ignore the eternal, life-giving water Jesus offers: "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, rivers of living water will flow from within them." The color of the season is green,--the color of growth, leaves, foliage, fruit and life. In the Church this green season suggests a time of spiritual growth—a time of spiritual growth for all us watered with the life giving water of Jesus.




