

Worship Notes 17th Sunday after Pentecost – October 5, 2025

We welcome our members and guests who are worshiping with us today, and pray God's rich blessings upon you during this time of worship!

THEME

Faith does not preclude Christians from adversity and persecution. Faith arms believers with Christ-like tenacity, equipping us to persevere in prayer and joy, continually confessing Jesus as the source of life and immortality. Temptations will come; believing saints will sin; yet repentant sinners will be forgiven. Satan will surely seek to undermine our faith, yet Christ Jesus in unrelenting mercy and forgiveness will guard us until the day of salvation.

ORDER

This morning we follow *Setting One* of the Divine Service. During this "green" season of Pentecost, our *Hymn of Praise* is the *Gloria in Excelsis*, taken from the song of the angels in Luke's Gospel!

HYMN OF THE DAY

Our *Hymn of the Day* this weekend, *God of Grace, and God of Glory*, was written by Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969) in 1930 for the opening of Riverside Church in New York City. The text was first published in 1932.

Although many scriptural references may be given for this prayer-based hymn, Psalm 80, in which the might presence of God in invoked, is central. The hymn's first stanza is a prayer for divine power reminiscent of St. Paul's encouraging words to Timothy, "For God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control," and of his blessing of the Christians at Rome "that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." While the hymn almost a century old, many of the theme hold true today. "Warring madness" constantly needs to be cured, and faithful stewardship expressed in Christian living.

The hymn is sung to the Welsh tune, CWM RHONDDA, thought to have been written around 1905.

What our Church Believes, Teaches and and Confesses regarding The Lord's Supper

The Bible teaches that Jesus gives us His very body and blood along with bread and wine in Holy Communion¹, and that these are means by which He forgives our sins², strengthens us for daily living, and draws us into closer fellowship with Him and other believers. The Bible also teaches us to examine ourselves prior to receiving the meal³. For those receiving Holy Communion, examine yourself with these questions:

Do I believe that I am a sinner and am I sorry for my sins?

Do I believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son and my personal Savior?

Do I believe that Christ's true body and blood are present in this holy meal for my forgiveness?

Do I truly intend with the help of God to correct my sinful life?

Our Lord invites to His table those who trust His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth His death until He comes. Those who are not members of a Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod congregation and have not communed at Immanuel previously are asked to speak with a pastor prior to the service. Those who are of a different confession (i.e., church body)⁴ or are unsure about communing, are invited to come forward during distribution with their hands folded in prayer, or held close to the chest and receive a blessing.






Faith as a mustard seed





Nicene Creed

- C hear our prayer.


Our prayers conclude:

Communion Confession

- **P** The Lord's Supper is God's gift for Christians who are properly instructed. In communing, we want people to receive Christ's body and blood for their good. This means that as you come to the Lord's Table you affirm with each communicant that Jesus is your Savior and Lord; and with Lutheran Christians you confess:
- I recognize and confess that I am a sinner. I repent of my sin and ask God's forgiveness.

I believe that Jesus Christ is my only Lord and Savior from sin, Satan and death.

I believe that the risen Christ is really present in the Sacrament and, under the form of the bread and wine, I receive His true body and blood for the forgiveness of my sins and the strengthening of my faith and life.

(Augsburg Confession – Article X)

I resolve to dedicate my life to the service of my Lord in His Body, the Church, by regular group worship, sacrificial giving, thankful living and **sharing the Gospel with others.** (*Romans* 12:1)

The Words of Our Lord


P Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night when He was betrayed, took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to the disciples and said: "Take, eat; this is My ⅓ body, which is given for you. This do in remembrance of Me."

In the same way also He took the cup after supper, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying: "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in My + blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."






Reception of the Lord's Supper


