

Worship Notes 15th Sunday after Pentecost – September 21, 2025

We welcome our members and guests who are worshiping with us today, and we pray God's rich blessings upon you during this time of worship!

THEME

Faithful stewards of God's gifts anchor themselves in constant prayer, intercession, and thanksgiving. Meager gifts of the poor ought to be intentionally safeguarded; the position and wealth of kings are to be highly regarded. Yet we know wealth belongs to a fallen world. Obsession with riches threatens our loyalty to God. Christ surpasses the value of all material possessions. He is our lasting treasure, who paid the greatest price—ransoming our lives at the cost of His own.

ORDER

This weekend we follow *Setting One* of the Divine Service. This service, with musical settings by Dr. Richard Hillert, was introduced to the LCMS in *Lutheran Worship* in 1982.

HYMN OF THE DAY

Our *Hymn of the Day* today, *Lord, Work in Me a Cheerful Heart*, comes to us from our newest hymnal, *One and All Rejoice (OAR)*. It was written by Lisa Clark (*b*. 1982) in 2020, and is a hymn about stewardship.

The hymn is a prayerful expression of a desire to cultivate a positive, joyful inner state that aligns with biblical principles, particularly found in Proverbs 17:22 ("*A cheerful heart is good medicine*") and 2 Corinthians 9:7 ("*God loves a cheerful giver*"). It calls for a proactive choice to embrace joy and gratitude, recognizing that a cheerful disposition has physical and spiritual benefits and allows one to reflect God's light to others.

The familiar tune, ST PETER, was written by English composer Alexander R. Reinagle, and is also paired with the hymn, *How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds*.

What our Church Believes, Teaches and and Confesses regarding The Lord's Supper

The Bible teaches that Jesus gives us His very body and blood along with bread and wine in Holy Communion¹, and that these are means by which He forgives our sins², strengthens us for daily living, and draws us into closer fellowship with Him and other believers. The Bible also teaches us to examine ourselves prior to receiving the meal³. For those receiving Holy Communion, examine yourself with these questions:

Do I believe that I am a sinner and am I sorry for my sins?

Do I believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son and my personal Savior?

Do I believe that Christ's true body and blood are present in this holy meal for my forgiveness?

Do I truly intend with the help of God to correct my sinful life?

Our Lord invites to His table those who trust His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth His death until He comes. Those who are not members of a Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod congregation and have not communed at Immanuel previously are asked to speak with a pastor prior to the service. Those who are of a different confession (i.e., church body)⁴ or are unsure about communing, are invited to come forward during distribution with their hands folded in prayer, or held close to the chest and receive a blessing.



God wants all to be saved.

¹First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, ²for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. ³This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, ⁴who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. ⁵For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, ⁶who gave himself as a ransom for all, which is the testimony given at the proper time. ⁷For this I was appointed a preacher and an apostle (I am telling the truth, I am not lying), a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth.

I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. ⁴I have decided what to do, so that when I am removed from management, people may receive me into their houses.' ⁵So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he said to the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' ⁶He said, 'A hundred measures of oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty.' ⁷Then he said to another, 'And how much do you owe?'




¹⁰"One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. ¹¹If then you have not been faithful in the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? ¹²And if you have not been faithful in that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own? ¹³No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money."

- C hear our prayer.



Communion Confession

- The Lord's Supper is God's gift for Christians who are properly instructed. In communing, we want people to receive Christ's body and blood for their good. This means that as you come to the Lord's Table you affirm with each communicant that Jesus is your Savior and Lord; and with Lutheran Christians you confess:
- I recognize and confess that I am a sinner. I repent of my sin and ask God's forgiveness.

I believe that Jesus Christ is my only Lord and Savior from sin, Satan and death.

I believe that the risen Christ is really present in the Sacrament and, under the form of the bread and wine, I receive His true body and blood for the forgiveness of my sins and the strengthening of my faith and life. (Augsburg Confession – Article X)

I resolve to dedicate my life to the service of my Lord in His Body, the Church, by regular group worship, sacrificial giving, thankful living and sharing the Gospel with others. (*Romans* 12:1)

The Words of Our Lord




Reception of the Lord's Supper
