# FROM THE PASTOR

"Believe it or Not", was within the title of a well-known TV show, which would seek to find stories which were difficult to believe, so bizarre and strange that people might question the validity of the claims. The idea was that the stories were indeed true, but so far-fetched that people would be surprised to find that they were true. It showed us just how limited our human judgment can be. Initially dedicated to sports, the franchise actually began in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century as a cartoon feature, and beyond TV and newspaper, has included books, posters, games, and museums.

It is certainly interesting (and enjoyable) to hear of stories that cause us to wonder how on earth they could be true. Yet, the title "Believe it or Not" implies that we have the right to judge whether or not we are able to believe something; that we have the authority to determine whether or not something is true.

Strangely, over time, the authority of personal discernment has continued to increase beyond its bounds. In case you missed this subtle cultural shift, "it is true, whether or not you believe it" quickly became "I believe it, whether or not it is true," which eventually became "I believe it, and that makes it true" (which is just like saying "I say it, and therefore it is true", ironically being the very definition of a lie). We were improperly told that it was our belief in something that was more important than the thing itself, whether true or not.

And yet it is the message of the Christian faith which shatters all optimism that we have the ability or the right to judge what is true. We stand in the midst of a faith passed down to us which in every way defies all sense and human reason. The acts of Christ or the whole of scripture: whether we believe it or we don't, it will still be true. Whether the multitudes are convinced, seduced, or enticed away from it, the truth of God as revealed through scripture is forever true. No man's judgment can stop it from happening; the Cross of Christ is always there for you. Eternal life through the death and resurrection of our Lord can never be undone.

The earth was created, the Red Sea was parted, the deaf were cured, the sick were healed, the sinful were made sinless, death is defeated, Christ is risen, and you; the baptized, were brought to new life, life eternal. It is the unbelievable nature of this claim which drives us to believe in it ... What we should find most unbelievable is that those who have heard these things still would refuse to believe in Him.

Know that you have the truth. Know that it has set you free. Hold fast to the Cross of Christ. The devil will always loudly object, but his truth is not THE truth; that God created us, loves us, came to earth for us, died for us, rose for us, redeems us, and lives to take us to Himself. It is for us to believe! No matter how unbelievable it may seem.

## BOARD OF STEWARDS

### Jesus, the Light

Are you waiting for something that seems to be too long in coming? Maybe it's a job promotion or a raise. Perhaps you've been praying for someone's salvation, and you don't see any sign of God's working in that person. It's difficult to wait. People in Jesus' day were waiting for a Messiah. It seemed to many that His coming was long overdue, but Paul writes in Galatians 4:4-5, "When the time had fully come, God sent His Son, born of a woman, born under law, to redeem those under law, that we might receive the full rights of sons." Our waiting is over! The Light has come into the world!

Unfortunately, not all who were waiting for the Messiah recognized Him when He came. In John 1:4-5 we read, "In Him was life, and that life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it." Still today the darkness misunderstands the Light. Yet He continues to shine, and, as He shines, He dispels darkness.

And He calls upon us to shine also. Jesus, in the Sermon on the Mount, described a lamp that is put on a stand so that it lights up the whole house. Then He said, "In the same way, let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in Heaven" (Matthew 5:16).

The only way to dispel darkness is to fill it with light. As stewards, it is our joyous task to be reflections of Christ's light. So we are "prepared in season and out of season: [we] correct, rebuke and encourage – with great patience and instruction" (2 Timothy 4:2). We are always prepared "to give an answer to everyone who ask [us] to give the reason for the hope that [we] have. And we do so "with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against [our] good behavior in Christ may be ashamed of their slander" (1 Peter 3:15-15). In this way we proclaim that the waiting is over! Jesus, the Light has come into the world!





For many brothers and sisters at Light of Christ, this fall was extra beautiful and meaningful. After more than three years of COVID-19, they finally had the opportunity to return to China and reunite with their families. This reunion holds a special significance beyond the joy of family gathering—it serves as a chance for many of our members to share the Gospel with their families while back in China. Many of us became Christians by God's grace when we came to the United States, and we eagerly anticipate spreading the Good News to our relatives in "foreign lands."

It has been four years since Sister Jin last returned to Hangzhou, China. Hangzhou is renowned for its affluence. Jin shared the Gospel and her personal journey to faith in Christ with her parents and friends. She notes that many people in Hangzhou are primarily focused on worldly pursuits, making it challenging for them to embrace faith in Christ. But there are lots of needs for them to get spiritual guidance. Despite these challenges, Sister Jin faithfully attended the Sunday worship service at a local church and attended Bible study every Friday via zoom. (See picture)



Sister Sue was baptized into Christ two years ago at Light of Christ. She faced the challenge of being unable to return, especially to visit her sick, 90-year-old mother, due to COVID-19. Sister Sue expresses deep gratitude that her mother had the opportunity to hear the Gospel and was baptized into Christ while she still has a clear mind. Sue sees this as a powerful manifestation of God's grace, mercy, and power in her mother's life. Sister Sue prays for God's continued grace for her mother!

Brother Ren hastily returned home due to a family emergency, expressing gratitude to God for His protection throughout the journey that safely brought him back to Chenzhou, China. After five years, he finds that although his hometown has not changed significantly, he was surprised by the friendliness of the people. With good public order, stable prices, and convenience due to the widespread use of AI technology, life has become more comfortable.

The last time Brother Tim and Sister Helen visited their relatives in Xiamen, China, was before the COVID-19. This time, in addition to reuniting with family and friends, their primary task was to evangelize and share the Good News with them. They felt that due to media restriction in China, people do not understand the Gospel and may even have misunderstandings. Therefore, they considered it important to go back and personally communicate with their relatives and friends. (See picture)



They have planted the seeds of the Gospel with their families and friends. The mission of the Lord Jesus to all Christians is recorded in Acts 1:8: "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." It is God's special blessing that we can take the Gospel to the Chinese. May the Lord greatly use the brothers and sisters of the Light of Christ!
